Everyone has a story about possums!

Members and guests in the audience were entertained by the presentation on "The paradox of the possum: possums in our lives in SA" given by Philip Roetman, PhD candidate and leader of the Citizen Science project in the Barbara Hardy Institute, UniSA, at the general meeting on Tuesday 6th September.

Philip led the audience through the positive aspects of the Citizen Science programme, which engages with listeners of ABC891 and their friends of all ages. The responses to the surveys enable researchers and policy makers to get a sense of how the community responds to wildlife and how our behaviour affects biodiversity. The audience was amazed to see what the impact of in-fill development in our suburbs has dramatically reduced the biomass of shrubs and trees in the environment.



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The presentation emphasised that we need to engage and educate people and that the key components of Citizen Science are research, engagement and education. (Much like what the Butterfly Conservation SA association is doing with our Public Talks Program -Ed.)

The surveys have, over the last 4 years, sought information about householder's management strategies for common wildlife like Blue-tongue lizards, magpies, possums and spiders. The environmental attitudes of the respondees can be influenced by training and on-line information

Engaging the community enables the voice of the community and this is enhanced by the publication of results from the surveys by the Institute. So far 2 publications have documented the surveys of magpies and possums "The Fearsome Flute Players" and "Possum Tail Tree" respectively. Future surveys are on hold as the staff review data and respond to the enormous number of enquiries.

With Barbara Hardy as the Institute's benefactor it is no wonder that these programmes are focused on all sectors of the community, especially Generation X (13-17 year olds). They are the future environmentalists, landholders and policy makers who we need to encourage to be engaged in Citizen Science.

UPDATE ON *Lucia limbaria* AT VICTORIA PARK

Following our wonderful winter rain the area where the butterfly food plant *Oxalis perennans* grow, was found to be overgrown with weeds. Fortunately an email to our good friends at the Adelaide City Council works department requesting the area be mowed brought a quick response and the area was mowed.

The need to monitor and undertake bushcare work continues however as more weeds encroach into this important area.

We are also keen to be find out more about the proposed Keswick stormwater detention basin planned for the parklands as this may impact on the *Lucia limbaria* butterfly site at Victoria Park.

Entry by donation (minimum of \$2). Please bring supper to share, tea/coffee will be supplied. Meetings should conclude by 8.30pm.

At the start of each meeting (other than in Aug) a ten minute presentation on a '*Butterfly of the Month*' will be given by a BCSA committee member.

6th March "From shore to sea; sea shells, sea dragons and other amazing sea creatures" Helen Tassie from the Malacological Society will talk about South Australian marine invertebrates, how they live, what they eat and their possible usefulness to us.

3rd April "Wildlife conservation in your back yard" James Smith of fauNature helps people to attract wildlife to, or manage the species they find, in their own backyard. This presentation will consider the vertebrate wildlife we find in Adelaide, what is "Wildlife Friendly" and why the backyard is so important for broader conservation.

1st May "Aboriginal use of the Adelaide Plains Flora" This interesting talk by anthropologist Dr. Philip Clarke will consider how Aboriginal people used local plants as food and medicine, as well as to make their artefacts.

5th June "Whales and Dolphins in SA and how research at the SA Museum helps to conserve them" Museum Researcher Dr. Cath Kemper will talk about the diversity of cetaceans in South Australia and how data from studying dead animals are combined with data from the sightings programme to learn more about these special mammals.

3rd July 3rd July "*Climate – Why does the rain fall and the wind blow?*" Founding Professor of Meteorology at the Flinders University of SA Emeritus Professor Peter Schwerdfeger has published over 100 papers and authored two internationally published books. This talk will be of interest to everyone.

7th Aug. BCSA AGM at 6.30 Talk commences 7.00pm **"Native Bees"** Many of our native bees have remarkable and interesting life histories, hear about them and what you can do in your garden to attract them from Museum researcher Dr. Remko Leijs.

4th Sept. *"Adelaide Moths"* BCSA Life Member Roger Grund has spent the previous year investigating the moths in his backyard on the hills-face at Torrens Park. He will talk about those findings with images of a variety of moths seen, including some early stage images.

2nd Oct. "Visiting Mawson's Hut, Commonwealth Bay, Antarctica" Hon. Research Associate at the SAMuseum Dr. Peter Shaughnessy has studied marine mammals for over 40 years. His illustrated talk will provide visitors with a glimpse into Antarctic life including 'the hut', seals and seabirds.

6th Nov. "Bats – survivors in todays" world" Adelaide's own batman Terry Reardon will provide a fascinating insight into the habits of South Australian bats and how you can help to conserve them.

DEAD TIMBER, LIVING BUSHLAND

If you want to collect firewood, make sure you obtain a permit first.

Permits are needed for anyone wishing to take logs and fallen timber from roadsides, camp grounds and other council land on Yorke Peninsula.

That's the word from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Community Liaison Officer, Deborah Furbank.

Dead trees and fallen timber play an important role in the bush. They add nutrients to the soil, protect soil moisture, store carbon and reduce erosion, while hollows in dead trees provide nesting sites for birds and bats.

During its various stages of decay, wood creates habitats for many different living things.

PROFILE Committee member Gerry Butler

Gerry Butler joined the Butterfly Conservation SA Committee in 2010 and brings experience to the association in working with not for profit organisations including Landcare and Organic Agriculture.

Gerry is employed by the upper Torrens Land Management Project (UTLMP) and is based at the Mount Pleasant Natural Resource Centre. This award winning project works with the many landholders in the headwaters of the River Torrens improving land management and achieving an environmental benefit. Gerry's experience as a geologist, before his professional Landcare career. Wood can create damp places for animals and fungi to live and for seedlings to grow, it can provide shelter and protection from predators for small mammals, birds, reptiles and insects.

Dead wood is removed from private and public bushland and roadsides for firewood, fuel reduction and aesthetic reasons. However, many people are unaware of the biodiversity value of dead wood and often see its removal as 'cleaning up'.

Fine fuels such as grasses increase the spread of fire. Large pieces of dead wood can act as small fire breaks and reduce the rate of spread.

Decaying pieces of wood contain large stores of carbon and contribute to organic matter in the soil.

As pieces of wood break down slowly, they provide slow release nutrients for the soil. As only small amounts of nutrients are released, the wood needs to be well dispersed and in good quantity, to provide a long-term source of nutrients to surrounding plants.

Since European settlement large amounts of native vegetation has been cleared on the Yorke Peninsula and many threatened plant species are now only known from roadside remnants. For these reasons, a permit is required in order to collect wood from the roadsides on Yorke Peninsula.

Maps are provided when people obtain permits to collect wood, outlining areas of environmental significance where wood may not to be collected.

What can you do to help?

- Leave hollow logs and trees alone they are homes for animals and birds.
- If you take wood from private or public land, leave some behind.
- If you take wood, plant a local, native tree.
- If collecting from roadsides ensure you have a permit and collect only from permissible areas.


